Private Herefordshire Regiment

James Winter was born on 16th November 1894 in Donnington but is shown in some military records as James Winters. He lived with his parents, Allen and Florence on Broomsgreen where his Father was a Baker & Grocer. He had two sisters, a younger sister Majorie, who was known by some in the family as 'Marj' and an older sister Annie.

He died of wounds on 26 August 1915 and is commemorated in the Hill 10 War Cemetery in Gallipoli, Turkey. It is presumed that his service would have qualified him for all the medals shown below in addition to a commemorative medal from the King sent to the family of all those who were killed in the war.

He is commemorated on the Dymock War Memorial and also on the Dymock Roll of Honour in St Mary's Church.
